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PASTOR'S REPORT TO ANNUAL MEETING

"1/12th of a Year"

Our first month here has been full of getting acquainted with people, settling into a new home and a new routine, trying to find out where things and places are, and the like. My first worship service as your pastor began the Christian year as the first Sunday in Advent, so it included our first communion together as well. Worship has been a joy to me, and I hope to all of you also. I have attempted to follow the format which the congregation is familiar with, and have occasionally given a children's sermon for the little ones; that part of the worship is always fun--you never know what the children will say or do!

I have written articles for the Parish Paper, helped compile the time and talent sheets for committee reference, and visited in several homes. Anyone who wishes especially to have me call, please let me know(!) and I will come to visit you at home.

I have taken part in youth activities: youth fellowship Christmas party, confirmation class, reunion brunch, and taken pictures at various events, which are pinned on the bulletin board. My first week here included four nights of Colony Meetings at the Troldahl's, which were fun and revealing times of sharing. At those meetings I got to know more about perhaps 1/3 of the members. I have taken part in the County Choir Christmas program, gotten acquainted with pastors in our denomination cluster group and in the Sibley County group (ecumenical). I have done visiting in the hospital and nursing home, had one pre-marital conference, no weddings, or funerals, no baptisms, dedications, confirmations, or new members added during this month. I am happy and proud to be a member of the church choir, and will continue to do so as long as I am here. I have met with various individuals and a few committees in helping to plan or complete work. I conducted worship on 5 Sundays and on Christmas Eve. We began a prayer fellowship group to remember the congregation and our community in prayer each Monday morning between 9-10 A.M. (Everyone is welcome to take part in that; even if

you cannot come to the church, you can pray at home or work sometime during that hour.

As I look forward to 1981, there are a few things I hope to see happen: getting better acquainted with everyone in the congregation is top priority; growing spiritually through prayer fellowship and Bible study is another goal; developing a Pastor/Parish Relations Committee and taking a look at the By-laws are two others I share with leaders of the church. Finally, if you have any suggestions or ideas, opinions or feelings about what the congregation or the pastor can do in service to our Lord, please feel free to tell me. We share a ministry here; all of us are ministers for our Lord, and we have joint responsibility for seeing that the work is done well. God be with you always!

REPORT OF PRESIDENT

For the Gaylord United Church of Christ, 1980 was our year of transition. There were enthusiastic hellos and reluctant good-bys. Dick Olmsted relinquished interim responsibilities to Larry Randen who served us for eleven months and did so much to prepare for the permanent leadership of Don Britt.

For me, the priorities of my office were to insure "business as usual" within the congregation and to help in the process and preparation for a new pastor. Fortunately, the job was to be shared with a loyal church council and dedicated pastoral search committee.

Larry Randen and I met on a regular basis to discuss the business and concerns of our congregation. Through these meetings Larry quickly acquainted himself with our congregation and easily became one of us.

To facilitate the transition, Larry and I prepared a handbook to be shared with the new minister and church organizations. The handbook documents the functions and responsibilities of every board or committee in our church.

In October the Search Committee recommended and congregation voted to call Don Britt as pastor for our church. Don began his ministry in December and will be formally installed in February. Four or five members of the Search Committee will continue to function as members of a newly formed Pastoral Relations Committee.

Some churches falter during interim periods. Some do, but not ours! The 1980 budget was met. Goals and plans were discussed for next year. Members put forth extra effort and our church saw growth and strengths. There was a sense of personal responsibility for the future of our church which pleased me.

How easy it would be to relax and "let Don do it." I challenge you and remind myself that our church will continue to prosper in direct proportion to the commitment of each member. Some work has been done but much more is just to begin. Share your talents, your time, your money and your prayers.

May God keep you in the circle of his love.

The committee met several times during the year to discuss our plans and our needs. There were two major purchases. The stained glass window which has recently been placed in the narthex of the church is the gift of Mr. and Mrs. I. M. Nelson and Mr. and Mrs. Dayle Troidahl, given in honor of the 50th wedding anniversary this month of John and Julia Estenson. It will be dedicated at some future Sunday morning worship service. The Memorial Committee was asked to choose the design of the window, and on October 7 made a trip in to the Gaytee Studios in Minneapolis, where with the assistance of Mr. Salisbury of that company, a tentative choice was made. A color drawing of the proposed window as sent out for the approval of the donors, and the window was ordered, made up, and was delivered and installed on Monday, December 22. The richness of color and Christian symbolism will enhance the beauty of our church and give enjoyment to our members and friends for years to come.

On October 7 a standing easel for the mounting of the bulletin board was purchased from Memorial Funds, and is now being used.

The committee also met with Genise Schueler concerning her wishes for a memorial to her husband, Wilmer Schueler. She expressed the desire for something of a "welcoming nature" to people as they enter the church. A wall unit or desk were among other suggestions. A second trip to Minneapolis was made on November 4 to investigate those possibilities. A wall unit and an oak desk were chosen for her approval, and Genise chose the oak desk which now stands in the narthex. It was dedicated on November 23 by our interim pastor, Larry Randen at the Sunday morning worship service. A pen set was later purchased with other memorial funds and placed on the desk to be used with the church guest register.
